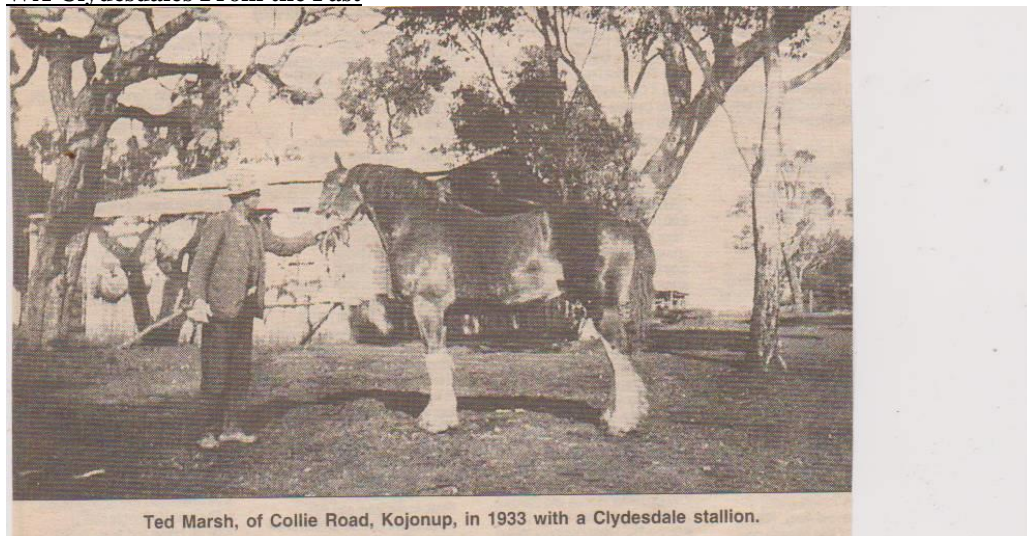

'Clyde' wins fight for life

THE first weeks of life have been a battle for a Clydesdale foal.

It was born at dawn on Tuesday last week on a farm at Badgingarra, east of Cervantes.

But later that night, owner Barney Pollitt discovered swelling around the foal's stomach and took it to the Epsom Equine Centre at Midland.

After an operation to repair a missing piece of stomach muscle and a blood transfusion to supply it with the colostrum the foal missed out on after birth, it will soon be ready to make the journey home.

The foal, nicknamed Clyde by veterinarian Bryan Hilbert, is now well on the road to recovery.

But the Pollitts will have to feed him by hand because he has been rejected by his mother.

Mr Hilbert said the operation was a rare one — he had performed the only procedure twice in the past 10 years.

"It's the first time I have performed this type of operation on a foal," Dr Hilbert said.

"It entails placing a piece of polypropylene mesh over the missing piece of muscle so the bladder and intestine don't intrude into the hernia."

Mr Pollitt and his son, Brian, hope to breed enough Clydesdales to get a team of harness horses.

"Although it's an expensive hobby — Clydesdales can cost upwards of \$2000 each — I'd like to help make sure the practice doesn't die out altogether," Brian Pollitt said.

Countdown to the Royal Show

CLYDESDALE foal Danny York has only nine weeks to prepare for his first brush with stardom.

The Clydesdale, born at Tipperary Farm in York on Monday, will be a major attraction at the Perth Royal Show which starts on September 27.

Although Danny York will be too young to compete, he will be on display during Show week, which ends on October 4.

He is of good stock. His father, Prince Victory, was a Melbourne show champion before going to stud.

His mother, Waverley Gold Chain, was Perth Royal Show's 1991 champion mare.

Tipperary Farm manager Judy Read said the Clydesdales were popular at the Show.

"As far as the general public goes, they are the most remembered horse in history," she said.

"They are a real crowd-drawer."

Ms Read said there were about 5000 Clydesdales in the world.

"About 18 months ago I read in an American magazine that Clydesdales had made the endangered equine list," she said.

"But with the state of the environment, I am confident that people will move away from tractors and start using Clydesdales again."

A star wobbles into the world

AT 70kg, McKayla the Clydesdale foal is a pretty big baby and guaranteed of instant stardom, according to her owners Keith and Jan Edmunds, of Augusta.

McKayla was born at 8am on Saturday and eight hours later was in the media spotlight, having photographs taken by *The Mail*.

Officially registered as Cloverleaf McKayla, she is the eighth Clydesdale in the stable of the family's award-winning Cloverleaf stud at Glenarty Road in Kudardup. And she has all the best characteristics of her breed, being big, docile and very friendly.

From birth, the new foal will grow 2.5cm a week and add 1kg in weight per day with 90 per cent of her overall development in the first 12 months.

Her mother, a gentle giant called Beereega Lara or Lara for short, is an old hand at the baby business, having now produced six healthy foals in her 11 years.

On Saturday she was keeping a watchful eye on the baby, which wobbled between frequent drinks from Mum and lying down to sleep in the sun.

Also supervising the new arrival was Rhody, the Rhodesian Ridgeback belonging to Greg and Jill Griston whose farm the horses are agisted.

Rhody gave McKayla a good licking all over as a birthday present and the pair are already firm friends.

Keith Edmunds, who has been breeding Clydesdales for years, said the latest foal was his second largest at birth and certainly one of the most attractive, despite being a little unsteady on her gangly legs.

"McKayla has beautiful markings and a perfect pair of eyes. On today's market she is worth at least \$2000, but it would be a shame to have to part with her," he

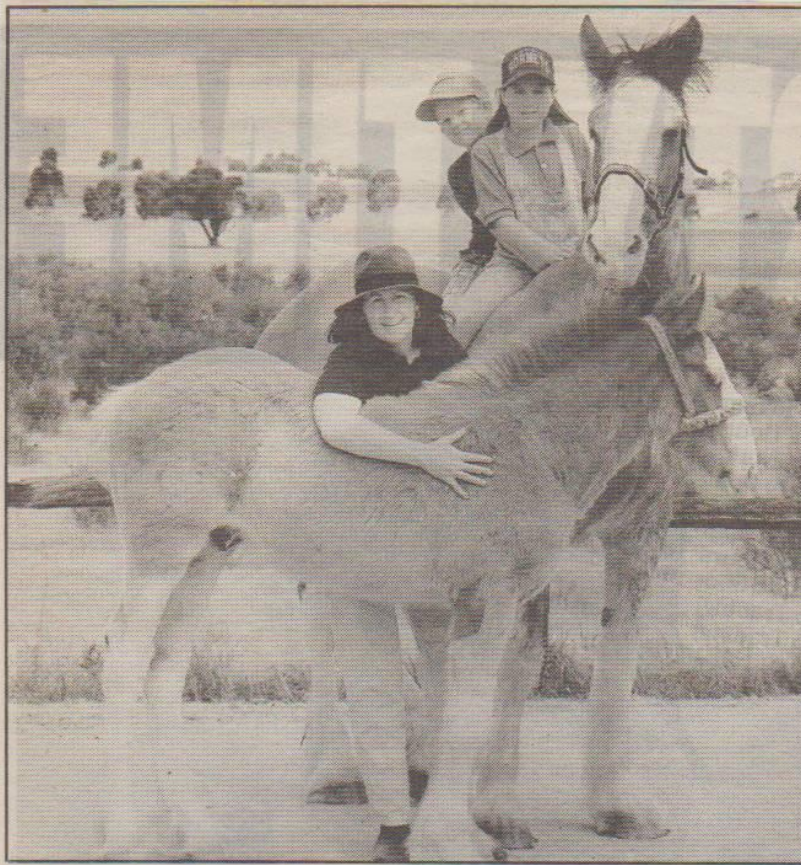

Big battler beats the odds

IT TOOK seven people to get this horse into the world, and upon arriving it had the gall to try to leave.

Thanks to the diligent care of Clydesdale breeder Judy Read the bulk of three-month-old foal York Goldsmith is still very much alive.

"He really is a miracle-boy," said Mrs Read, who runs York Clydesdale Stud at Tipperary Farm with husband Kim.

The foal, sired by a 21-year-old stallion described as ancient by Mrs Read, was three weeks premature and facing the wrong way at birth, requiring the delicate efforts of five adults and two children to extricate it.

"He swallowed a lot of fluids during

the birth, and was very sick," Mrs Read said.

The unmoving horse had to be rolled and massaged to prevent sores from developing.

Mrs Read and her helpers fed the foal by hand with milk taken from the mother, Waverley Gold Chain. This led to the further problem of the foal losing its suckling instinct.

To top it all, a short while later the foal's mother, perhaps scared by foxes, stepped on "Smithy" and broke its leg.

This meant changing the cast on its leg every five days as he grew rapidly.

For Mrs Read, all the effort was worth it. "It's amazing he has survived, we have lost other foals much more easily," she said.

Jeanette Newbold could tell you a thing or two about this little fella.

Cryptococcosis

Synonym(s): Systemic mycosis

Introduction

- **Cause:** infection with the opportunistic saprophytic fungus *Cryptococcus neoformans*  *Cryptococcus* spp in a  immunocompromised host.
- **Signs:** depend on site of infection; respiratory disease, meningitis, weight loss, nasal discharge, cough, abdominal pain; abortion, neonatal pneumonia; skin granulomas.
- **Diagnosis:** direct microscopy, culture; endoscopy, radiography; biopsy and histopathology; post mortem.
- **Treatment:** fluconazole, itraconazole, amphotericin B; surgical removal.
- **Prognosis:** poor.
